## 1921

Once again the camp was threatened by a forest fire. This time was reportedly caused by loggers. The fire worked it's way up from the Porcupine spring and from Tracy's Bay to the Toronto Club point. It did not damage the Toronto Club cabin. Our entire point would have been swept away by the fire if it had not been for the lumberman, Mr. Foster, on the lake who showed up with a scow, pump and hose. The fire reached within 100 yards of the main lodge. The men in Camp had been fighting the fire night and day for nearly a week.

With the possibility of prohibition looming, the members legally stocked up on Canadian Club and Imperial Whiskey. Many bottles and three 10 gallon kegs were purchased for future requirements. The bottles and one keg were buried under the main lodge and the two other kegs were hidden on Sandy's Island (Sandy Hook) Dr. H. H. Sanderson purchased Sandy Hook this year. No record of the cook was found so it is presumed to have been Thomas Longley.
