The gasoline boat purchased from Mr. Marks in 1916 was sold and the members commissioned Guy Hayward and his father to begin construction of the first Hyah Hyah. The boat was a 28 foot wooden launch powered by a 4 cylinder Kermath gasoline engine and the vessel was completed for the 1924 season at a cost of \$1,269.09 . It was a grand boat, large, enough to transport large amounts of supplies and men around the lake in style. If Morton's Point had a trade mark it would have to be the "Hyah-Hyah". Guy also built a row boat for the members for \$35.00. The members named the rowboat the "Robert L". After surviving three engines, the Hyah Hyah was declared unfit for rebuild in 1971 and retired after 48 years of service - a long time for one boat!

The main cabin was broken into in the spring of 1923 and food and other things were stolen. Mattresses, blankets etc. were left exposed to mice and were totally damaged. Mr. MacRae caught the thieves who were sent to jail for 3 months.
