

1945

The war was over. The Club was asked, by the President, Dr. Joseph L. Sanderson, to reserve memberships for the men who had fought in the war so the tradition of the original group who pioneered the Club would be perpetuated.

Dr. Joseph L. Sanderson mentioned in his "1944 President's Report", that the Island directly opposite the Camp, previously owned by his late father, that he regarded the Island as part of the Club and knew it added greatly to the privacy of the members. He stated that this Island now owned by himself and his brother Harvey would at some future date be turned over to the Club.

The Club had a profit of \$193.03 this year which was added to the Surplus Account.

The plans for the 16' x 23' log addition to the main lodge with inside toilet on a septic system and a stone fireplace & metal heatolator on the south wall had been drawn up and estimated at \$700.00 by Guy Hayward since the last meeting. It was intended to replace the lean to sleeping quarters presently used. The shareholders agreed to the plan at the meeting on May 25, 1945 and sent it forward to the new Board for inspection. The money in the surplus fund would cover the estimated cost. A letter from Guy Hayward was read by the new Board which stated the work could commence in September 1945. Guy Hayward was authorized to purchase the necessary materials and the Board was to arrange the tearing down of the old sleeping quarters by members through the summer season. By the end of the summer season, the plans to build the addition had been abandoned. Other repairs and replacements were deemed a higher priority such as a new roof on the main lodge, rebuilding and widening of the front and rear porch, shoring up the boathouse and strengthening the structure, installing just a sanitary toilet and septic system, the purchase of a new row boat and 2 motors.

V. Guy Hayward was invited to Walkerville, at Camps expense, to discuss his offer to take the old Hyah-Hyah, damaged motor and all, in trade for his building of a new shorter boat with a hull similar to the Betty Lou. With a new up to date motor, the estimated cost was \$1,325.00 . The

meeting took place on October 17th, 1945 in Walkerville, Windsor. The following was the end result. Re shingle main lodge \$112.50, front porch enlarged to 32' x 12' \$365.00, new toilet and septic tank put on hold, outhouses were to be moved and new pits dug, foundation and structure repairs to boathouse \$25.00, a new motor to be installed in the Hyah-Hyah \$580.00 and Guy Hayward was to get the old Buchanan Jr. 4 motor from the Hyah-Hyah in trade for installing the new motor. All these projects were set to be undertaken, starting some immediately and the balance starting in the spring of 1946.

Camp opened on July 13th, 1945. Camp rates were set at \$4.00 per day for members and \$5.00 per day for guests with a 14 person limit in Camp at one time. The Camp had a profit of \$288.42 this year.

Harry Holmes and Jean Morin finished as Camp Help after many years of great service to the club. The cooks this year were Mrs. Ladd and her grandson Kelvin.
